

Loans given by the government can cover a large portion of your study costs. However, the requirements look different depending on your country of residence. We help you find out if you qualify for a loan.


Funds & foundations



FIND THE ESSENTITIES

What duration do the degrees have? And are you allowed to work while studying?

Each country has very different things to offer. Some countries are known for their lifestyle, others for the nature or high academic level.

USA

Are you looking for a place with friendly and outgoing people, famous pop-culture and endless opportunities? Then look no more, the US is the country for you.

The US has a wide selection of study options and is one of the top choices for international students.

UK

In England, tradition and innovation go hand in hand, and you can find a mix of ultra-modern institutions and prestigious universities offering some of the best education in the world.

Canada

Canada is home to an abundance of natural wonders, big cities, and an active lifestyle and you can get a good quality education with high academic standard. In the US an associate degree takes 2 years, a bachelor's degree typically 4 years and a master's degree 2 years.

Working on a student visa in USA is not allowed, however, some unis offer work through campus.

After completing a degree you can apply for OPT (Optional Practical Training) that allows you to work in the US within your field of study for up to 12 months.

A bachelor's degree normally takes 3 years to complete [4 years if you decide to do an internship], and a master's degree takes 1 year.

As an international student you can work up to 20 hours per week and full-time during holidays.

In Canada a bachelor's degree typically takes 3-4 years and a master's degree around 2 years.

You are allowed to work 20 hours per week while you study. Once you have completed a certificate, diploma, or degree of at least 8 months you can apply for working rights.



Australia

Want to study Down Under? Studying in Australia means exciting cities, miles of sandy beaches, unique nature and wildlife topped with a wonderful climate.

Australia is a fantastic country, both in terms of education and adventures. The universities have a very high academic standard with a strong international focus. A bachelor's degree in Australia often takes 3 years and a master's degree 1,5 years.

When studying in Australia you have great options for working whilst studying. You can work 40 hours every two weeks and full-time during holidays.

It is also possible to stay on in Australia and work upon receiving your degree.

New Zealand

Stunning nature, amazing scenery and friendly people characterize New Zealand.

And who doesn't like that? As a student you will experience a culture and scenery like in no other country while enjoying top-notch universities. In New Zealand you can take a bachelor's degree in 3 years and a master's degree in 1-2 years.


Your working rights depend on how long you are studying. If you study a full degree, you can work 20 hours per week and full-time during holidays.

You might also be eligible for a post-study work visa (4 years full-time) after graduating.

Japan

In Japan, you will have the opportunity to enjoy sights and delights such as big metropolises, beautiful temples, hot springs, flowering cherry trees, friendly people, high technology, sumo wrestlers, and of course sushi. A bachelor's degree in Japan is 3-4 years long while a master's degree is mostly 2 years long.

Students can work 28 hours per week and 40 hours per week during holidays.


FINDING THE DREAMLIFE IN HAMAII





Picture this: It's summer and you're about to start your master's degree. The cold months are approaching fast, so what are you going to do?

You board the plane to Hawaii and take your master's degree in perfect tropical surroundings. Well at least that's what Maren chose to do, and she has absolutly no regrets.



So Maren, why Hawaii in the first place?

I think I've always felt that while I am young and studying, I don't want to just stay in Norway. I want to do something fun, do something different and experience something new. I just love to travel and live other places and experience other cultures and new languages and Hawaii is perfect for that since it's very multicultural.

Did you go all by yourself?

Yeah, I went all by myself, so I didn't know anyone when I was coming here. That was actually a crazy experience, going from not knowing anyone to now where we are maybe 60-70 Scandinavians hanging out all the time. There's a lot of foreign students here.





How is the daily life in Hawaii?

I have 3 courses each semester, so I am attending school Monday, Tuesday and Friday for about 3 hours each day. And when I am not in school, I I just travel around the island, snorkelling with dolphins, going on boat trips and I also hike a lot. It's a lot of fun and social and to be honest it's not super hard in school so far, but it's a good balance.

In general, I would say that I spend less time on the academic stuff than back home, because to get an A in Norway you have to study a lot and really put in an effort and exam periods had up to 7 exams and it was just super tough. It's way more chill here.







What are you doing when you're not studying?

There's a lot of different sports clubs at HPU such as football, soccer etc. but I have been playing handball for 13 years and it's really my thing, but USA is not really great at that and almost no one knows what it is, so I just go to the gym a lot and then I go hiking.

We have also been to 2 of the other islands. We went to see the erupting volcano on Big Island and then we also went to Kauai, which is a proper Hawaiian island. Even though it's very green and tropical around Honolulu, it still also a big city with skyscrapers and big buildings, whereas Kauai is just very authentic and reflects much more what you think Hawaii is going to be.

What is your best advice to the person reading this?

Be openminded and don't be afraid to put yourself out there and meet new people, because everyone who comes here is in the same situation and has the same mindset. Everyone is a bit nervous in the beginning, but I haven't met anyone who went to study abroad and didn't love it.



"It's all green and all about mountains, and you can go hiking and go to tide pools and waterfalls and it's an insane life. Sometimes i ask myself, is this even real?"

Even though it might not turn out exactly how you imagined, whether it's school wise or social wise, it's always a learning experience and something you will remember for the rest of your life. So, I would say just do it!
